

DIY Double X Outdoor Table

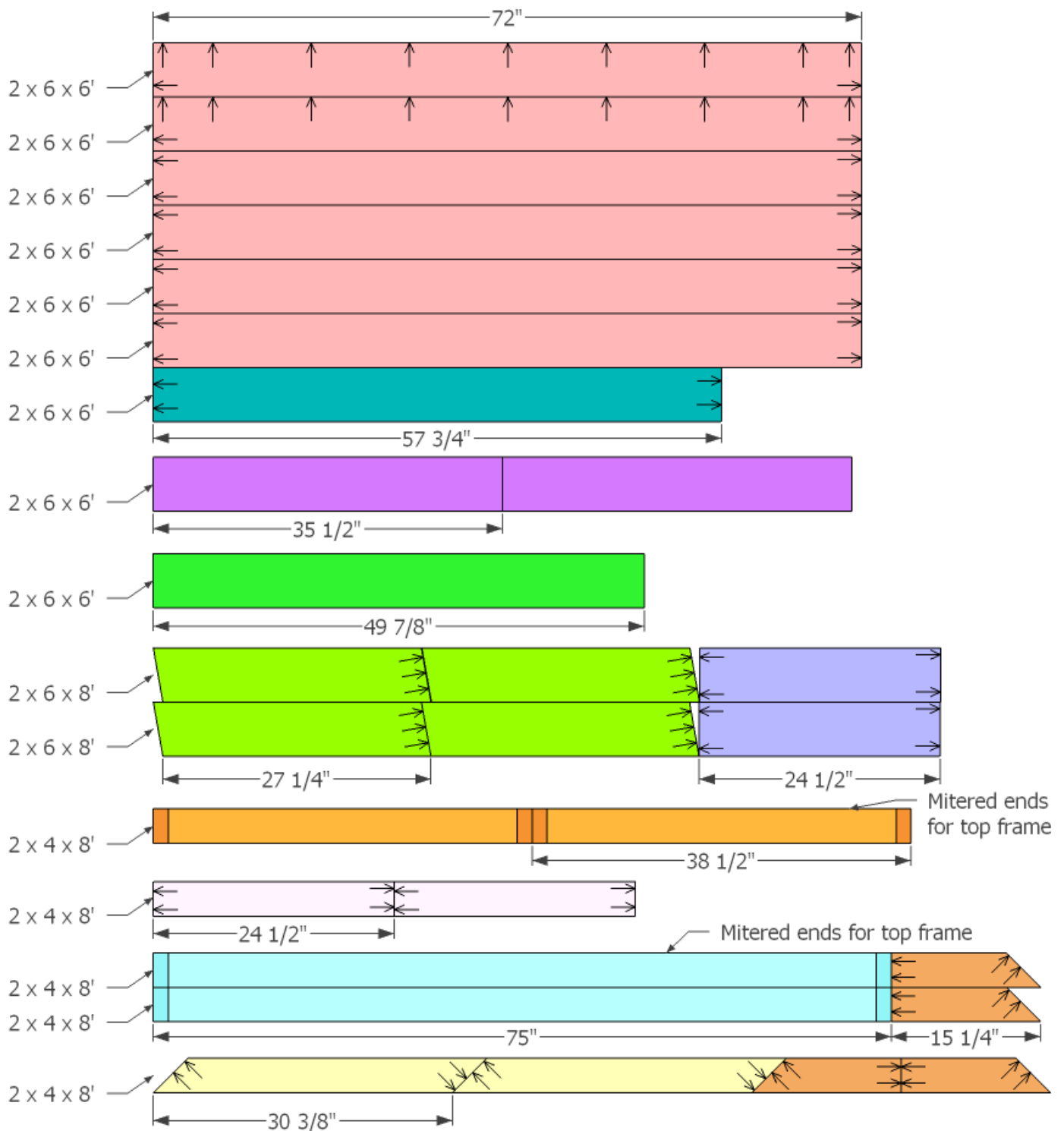
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Supply List

Item	Quantity	Description
2 x 6 x 6'	9	Pine or whitewood board
2 x 6 x 8'	2	Pine or whitewood board
2 x 4 x 8'	5	Pine or whitewood board
2-1/2" pocket hole screws	98	
2-1/2" wood screws	About 1lb	
Wood glue		
Finish of choice		

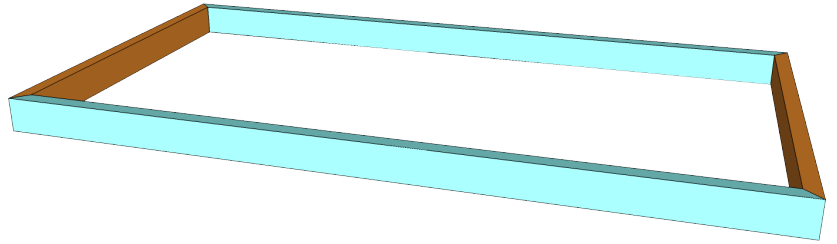
Drill pocket holes for 2-1/2" pocket hole screws as indicated by the arrows.

All angle cuts on the X pieces are 45 degrees and the legs are cut at 10 degrees. Some of these lengths may be a tad different for your exact table so measure and cut as you go. The top trim pieces are mitered on end and show the longest length in this cutting layout.



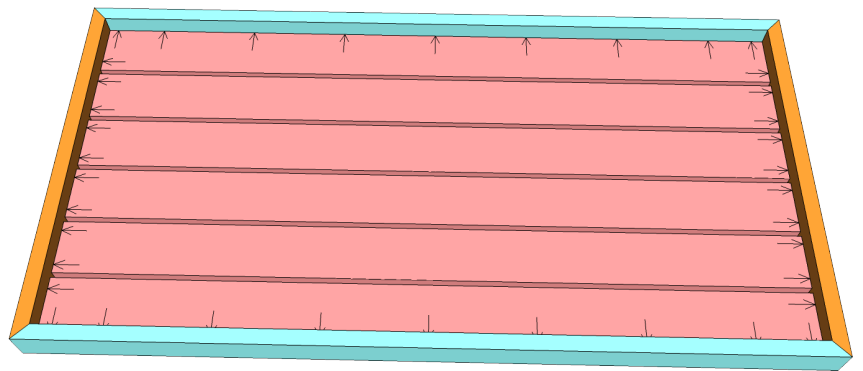

Layout your top frame pieces. The table will be built upside down. Pre-drill and countersink two 2-1/2" wood screws into each miter to connect them. These can be filled with wood filler later.



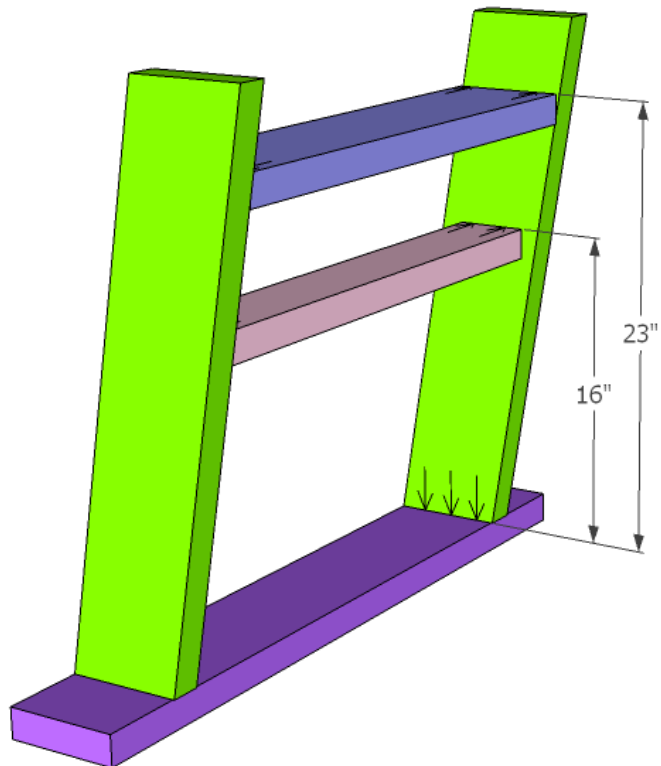

Add your top planks to the frame and secure them with pocket hole screws. Space the interior planks evenly. The measurements in this plan will leave a 1/2" gap between the top planks.



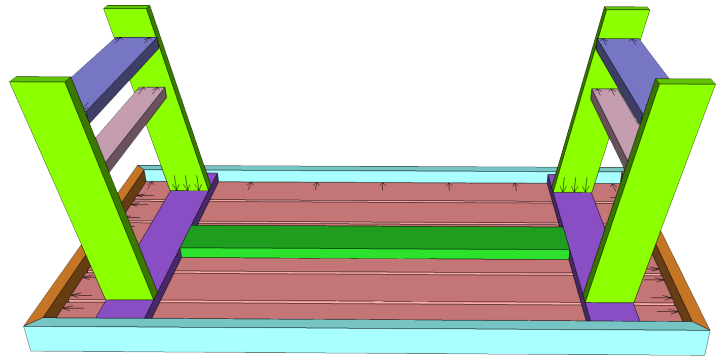

Assemble the legs separately. They are spaced evenly left to right. The 2 x 4 horizontal piece is spaced 16" parallel from the top of the legs and the 2 x 6 horizontal piece is spaced 23" parallel from the top of the legs.



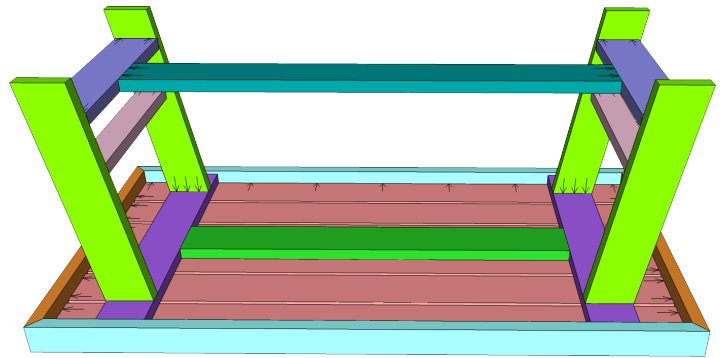

Add the leg assemblies and upper support to the bottom of the top assembly. Use 2-1/2" wood screws to attach everything.



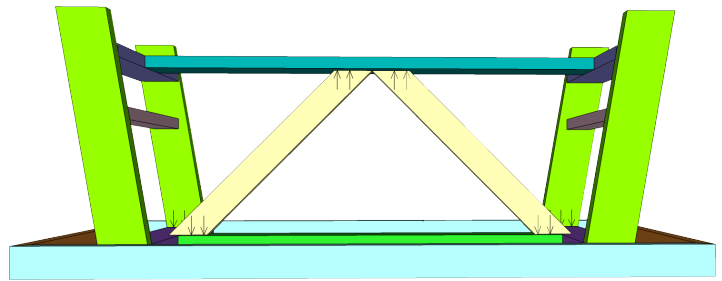

Add the lower stretcher. In a perfect world your's would be the exact length as indicated in this plan. If your legs are a tiny bit off of 10 degrees the length of this stretcher will vary. That's OK. Just cut your piece to the correct length.

Again, measure and cut for the long parts of the X.
