




CUT LIST



Note: I ripped the round edges off of all 2x boards. This will give seamless edges between the 2x6 sides and a straight, clean look for slats. If you choose not to rip your boards make sure to adjust the measurments accordingly.




After making all of your cuts, start by building the sides of the chairs. Do this by stacking 4 boards on top of one another. Attach with wood glue and 2 1/2" deck screws between each board.






Next, attach the 2x2 cleats to the inside of the 2x6 blocks, according to the measurments below. Use wood glue and 2 1/2" deck screws.




Now, build the guide for the back of the chair. Attach a 1x2 to each edge of the 1x4 support with wood glue and 1 1/4" deck screws. The backs of the 1x2's should be flush with the back of the 1x4.






Next, center the guide over two slats. The end of the guide should be flush with the edge of the slats. Attach the guide to the slats with 1 1/4" deck screws and wood glue. Attach the two remaining supports, 1 1/2" from the end of the slats, with 1 1/4" deck scews and wood glue.





Attach the guide and supports to the remaining slats. Use the spacer blocks that you cut to space them out evenly. Attach them with 1 1/4" deck screws and wood glue.




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Set the back rest aside and begin attaching the slats to the seat. Start with the end slat and attach it to the cleat with 2 1/2" deck screws and wood glue. Make sure the edge of the slat is flush with the edge of the ends of the chair.



Use the other 2 spacer blocks to space the slats out evenly.

Before attaching the final slat, lay the back rest on the cleats, flush with the back of the chair. The final slat should butt up to the end of the back rest (this is necessary for the piano hinge attachment). The spacer block may not fit perfectly between the final slat and the previous one. That's okay.






Remove the back rest and attach the remaining slat under the cleats and 6" from the end of the chair. Attach the slat with 2 1/2" deck screws and wood glue from the top of the cleat and into the slat. This piece will act as the hinge board.

Tip: hold the slat in place


with a set of clamps.

Lay the back rest, face down, on top of the bottom slats. Make sure the ends are flush and attach the piano hinge. The pin of the piano hinge should be centered on the seam where the slats meet.




Now, build the arm by laying the mitered board on top of the shorter board. The bottom of the boards should be flush with eachother. Attach them together with 1 1/4" deck screws and wood glue. Then, attach the arm to the center of the







Now it's time to attach the stops, inside of the guide. Hold the back rest where you want it to stay and lower the arm inside the guide. Attach a stop right above the arm with wood glue and 1 1/4" deck screws. Repeat this step for the second stop. This allows you to place the back rest in 3 postions, flat middle and upright, to your preference.
