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# Rustic Modern Side Table

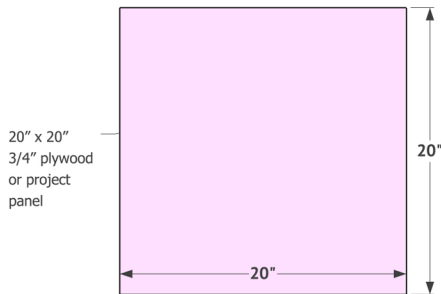

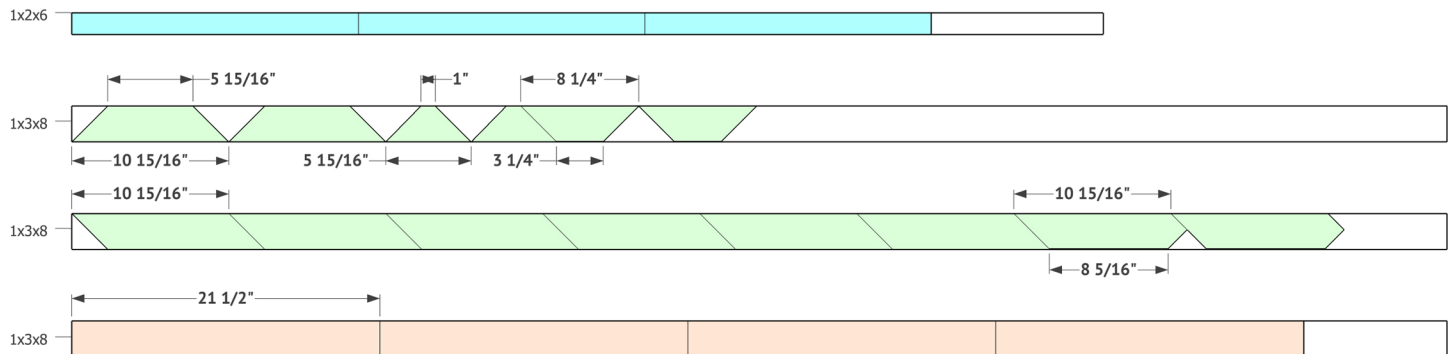

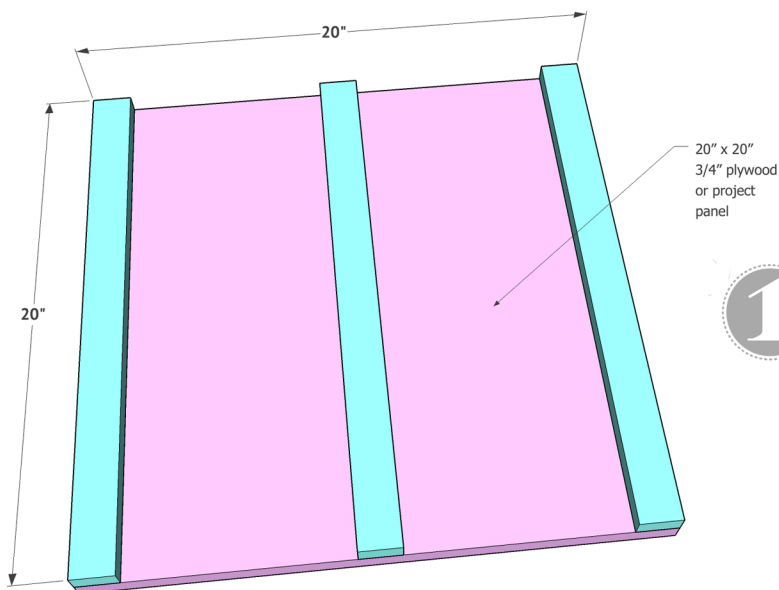

## CUT LIST



It's best to cut as you go! Use these measurements as a guide but measure each cut as you go!





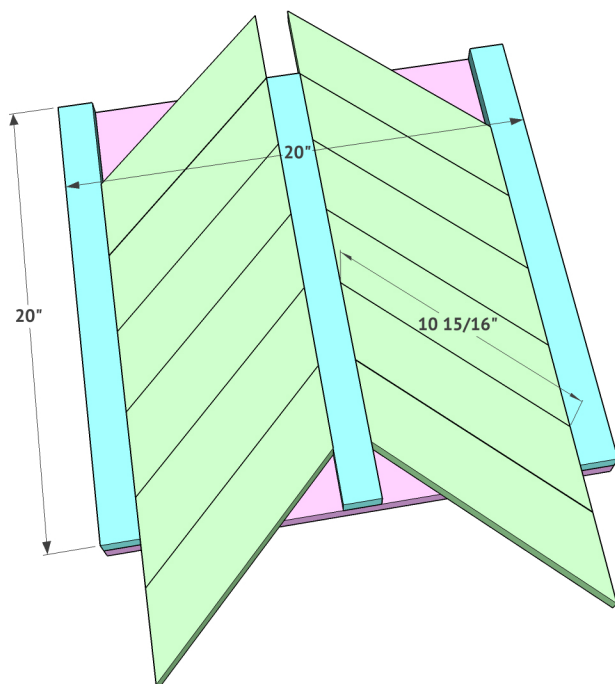
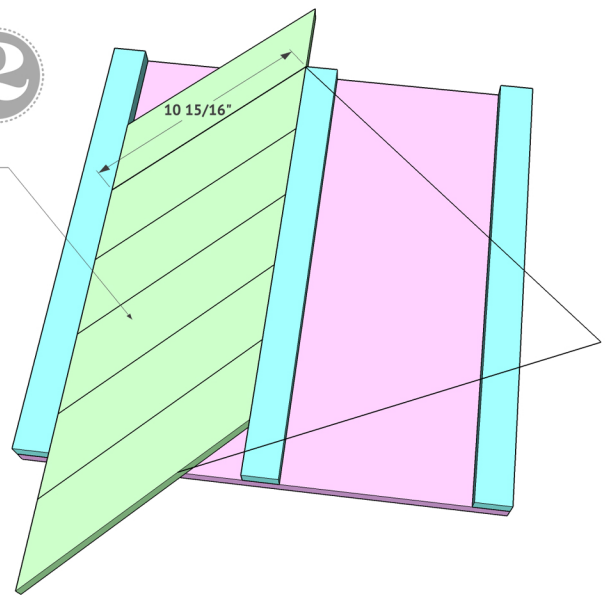

Attach the 1x2 boards to the project panel first using wood glue and 1.25" brad nails. Two of the boards will be flush on each side and the other board will be centered on the panel.

Start by lining up one side. These are simple 45° cuts on each end. I did put the exact cuts on the cover sheet, but measure and cut as you go. I found it easiest to make several of the same size like you see here, and then make my smaller pieces from the scrap I cut off. We made all cuts and dry fit everything before attaching.

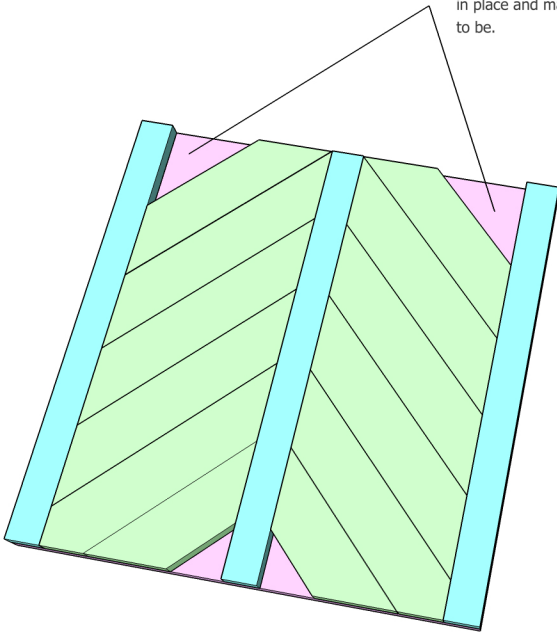
Each of these are 45° cuts on each end

Now repeat the same thing on the opposite side.

Now use the scraps from the boards you marked and cut to fill in these spaces. Just hold a scrap in place and mark where the cut needs to be.

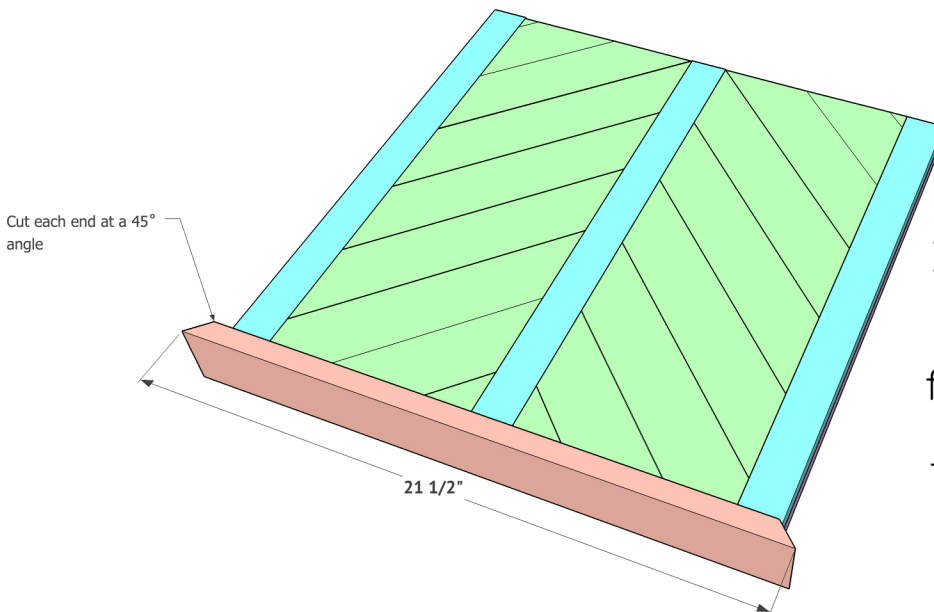
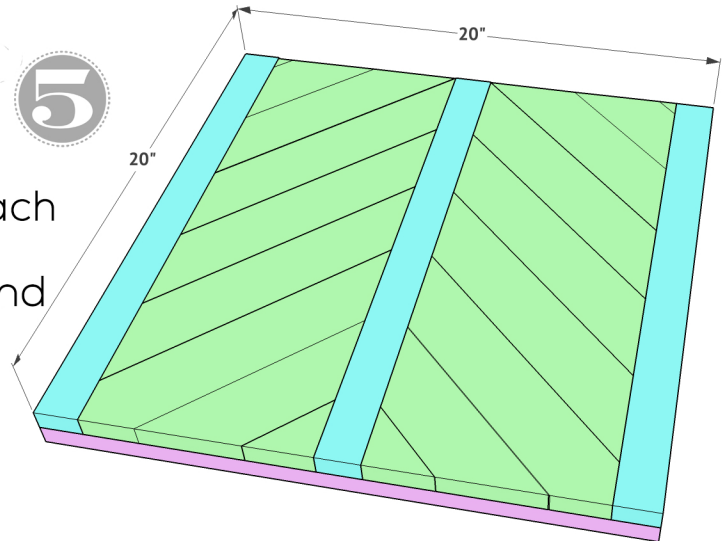

Now fill the smaller spaces with the scrap you cut from the other boards. Remember these are simple 45° cuts!

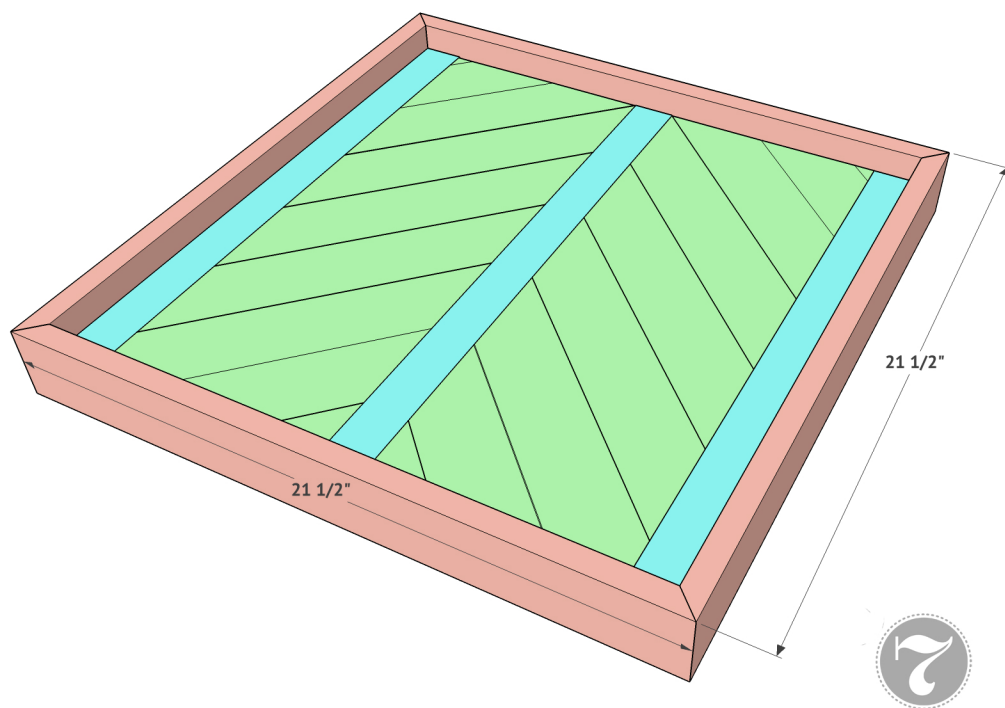
Once you have made all the cuts and dry fit everything, attach all of the patterned boards to the panel using wood glue and 1.25" brad nails.

The trim pieces are also 1x3 boards. We chose to add a 45° cut to each corner to give the table a clean finished look. Line the base of each trim board up flush with the bottom of the panel. This will leave the top with an overhang giving it a tray look.



Measure and cut the rest of the trim boards to size and attach them to the outside of the panel using wood glue and brad nails. Now you are ready for legs! Be sure to check the website for a link to the legs we used. This would also make the cutest tray! Add a couple pulls to the sides and you are set! Have fun with it!
